

The Screwtape Letters, by C. S. Lewis Junior Summer Reading Guide

While C. S. Lewis's masterpiece, *The Screwtape Letters*, first published in 1942, does not qualify as Renaissance literature, it is a well-known and important book. It deals with the issues of sin, temptation, and resisting evil, all of which are crucial to understand as your spiritual lives mature.

It also deals with spiritual warfare and the existence of evil spirits who desire to remove us from our relationship with God, a topic that we will examine extensively as we address Dante's *Inferno*. Please note that most of these questions deal with an understanding of the text, and we will examine deeper, thought-provoking questions as we discuss this book in our first weeks of Literature 11 in August.
